#### 90TH ANNIVERSARY OF ARMISTICE DAY

The mission of the Royal Canadian Legion is *TO* SERVE VETERANS AND THEIR DEPENDENTS, TO PROMOTE REMEMBRANCE AND TO ACT IN THE SERVICE OF CANADA AND ITS COMMUNITIES.

There are many different Acts of Remembrance which honour the memory of the fallen and pay tribute to the sacrifices and accomplishments of Veterans. One of the more poignant events, is the 90th Anniversary of Armistice Day, the 11th day of November 1918.

World War I was a major conflict fought in Europe between 28 July 1914 and 11 November 1918. Nations from across the globe were involved and over eight million people died, although Russia, Britain, France, Germany and Austro-Hungary dominated.

During World War I (1914-18) more than 600,000 Canadians volunteered to go overseas. As of November 2008, only one was still alive -- John Babcock aged 107, who was born on an Ontario farm and now lives in Spokane, Washington. These troops fought a series of bloody battles and by the end of the war, more than 66,000 Canadian solders had been killed and 172,000 wounded.

The Flanders Poppy was adopted by the Allied nations as the *FLOWER OF REMEMBRANCE* because it was most evident in the battle fields of Northern France and Belgium after hostilities.

In recent times, there has been some confusion as to whether the *DAY* is Armistice Day or Remembrance Day. After World War II (1941-1945), it was deemed more appropriate to commemorate the sacrifices of *ALL CONFLICTS* and named *REMEMBRANCE DAY*. The tradition of Armistice Day remained until 1946, when *TWO MINUTES OF SILENCE* was adopted and the 11th day of November designated remembrance Day.

In keeping with the adoption of "All Conflicts" and 11 November, the Torch of Remembrance was passed to representatives of Veterans, Cadets, Peacekeepers and an Active Solider in a Remembrance Day Ceremony held in Ottawa, at the National Military Cemetery, 11th November 2008.

Take up our quarrel with the foe:
To you from failing hands we throw
The torch; be yours to hold it high.
If ye break faith with us who die
We shall not sleep, though poppies grow
In Flanders fields.

#### 2008 ENTERTAINMENT REPORT

2008 was a busy year for Branch 127's Entertainment Committee. As in previous years, it provided refreshments for monthly meetings, Remembrance Week activities, and this year, for Public Service, Branch 127's 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Wine and Cheese Reception. Our traditional Christmas dinner on December 9 catered by Goldstream Catering was also arranged.

Several self-sustaining barbecues and theme nights were held throughout the year. Regular barbecues were held in April, May, and June. The first theme night was held in February to help break up the winter doldrums with a Hawaiian theme. August was the ideal month to have a Burger Indoor/Outdoor Movie Night with "Blazing Saddles" being the main feature. Naturally, October lent itself to Oktoberfest. The attendance at these functions ranged from approximately 25-35.

In September, a Wine and Cheese Reception celebrating the Branch's 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary was held on the premises. Commemorative ribbons and engraved napkins were provided for guests and the extra ribbons were sent with the Fall Newsletter to those members unable to attend. Photos of the event were taken by Rodger Wright and included in the Fall Newsletter. A very popular highlight of the reception was a set of seven collages, created by Alison Fisher,

using photos taken of Branch members and events over the decades.

Remembrance Week of course was our other important event this year. In recent years, the Province has generously provided an array of refreshment after Rotunda Service so as an experiment this year, the Branch reduced its offering for this day only and focused more on the Remembrance Day refreshments. This change worked very well, with minimal leftovers or wasted food. Commercial catering was provided by Thrifty Foods and two types of home-made chili were provided - regular chili by Jenny Fossum and vegetarian by Rodger Wright. A special banner to thank and honour veterans for their sacrifices was created by Mrs. Terry Willow's Grade 1 class at St Margaret's School (photos on pages 6-7). Terry is the daughter of the late Doug Hudson.

The limit of 40 guests was quickly met for the Christmas dinner held once again at 521 Superior. Branch 127 provided the table wine. Many thanks to Al Fleury, Gail Hanson, Harry & Lis Addison, Heather Clark & Rodger Wright for the lovely decorating job which added so much to this festive occasion.

The 2008 expenditures for this committee were \$1351.55, up from \$596.93 last year. This jump is due to the 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Wine and Cheese Reception. Its expenses were \$735.74 for catering and mementoes. Remembrance Week expenses were \$391.40 and the refreshments for general meetings totaled \$126.77. The Christmas dinner made a slight profit of \$21.52.

**Update 1:** A new stove was purchased and installed by Gail Hanson and Al Fleury in early January. It looks great and it is totally accidental that the colour is almost an exact match with the decor.

You see, I died today.


by Lt. Dean Shatlain, Tank Commander Written on the Battlefield of Africa
